**SIDEWALKS** – Snow/ice is to be removed from the sidewalks within 24 hours after a winter storm ceases. Properties at street intersections: **please** clear the snow that piles up at the sidewalk corners. This will help school children, the postal service and other pedestrians safely cross the street. We ask those who do not have sidewalks to follow this as well.

**PLOWING STREETS** – The snow plows will be plowing snow from “curb to curb” to remove as much snow from the streets as possible. This process takes time so please have patience and bear with us as we work to clear the streets as quickly as we can. When removing snow from your sidewalks, do not shovel the snow into the streets.

**\*\***In heavy snow storms, plows will be clearing driving lanes as quickly as possible and then will go back to work on clearing the sides/shoulders of the roads from curb to curb. Unfortunately, this sometimes pushes snow back on to your sidewalks which you may already have shoveled. If this occurs, we apologize for the inconvenience and added work that it may cause you, but it is essential to make our streets safe.

In the event of a **Snow Emergency**, announcements will be made on **WGAL-TV 8, FOX 43, ABC 27 WHTM, WARM 103.3, 96.1 WSOX, WGTY GREAT COUNTRY 107.7, WYCR 98.5 THE PEAK**, and the local newspapers.

**NO PARKING** will be allowed on the “snow emergency routes” when an emergency is declared. Vehicles that are not moved will be towed at the vehicle owner’s expense.

***Snow Emergency Routes:***

The following streets shall be declared snow emergency routes: (they are marked)

- Main St.
- South side of W. Maple St. from Borough Line to N. Walnut St.
- South side of E. Maple St. from N. Walnut St. to N. Park St.
- N. Walnut St. from Main St. to Maple St.
- S. Walnut from Main St. to E. Gay St.
- E. Gay St. from S. Walnut St. to S. Pleasant Ave.
- N. Pleasant Ave. from Main St. to E. Broad St.
- E. Broad St. from N. Pleasant Ave. to N. Lombard St.
- N. Lombard St. from E. Broad St. to Borough Line
- S. Pleasant Ave. from Main St. to Borough Line
- N. Park St. from Main St. to E. Maple St.



Temporary parking is available at the following locations when a snow emergency is in effect: Fire Company parking lot, High School and Elementary School parking lots and Bethlehem United Methodist Church, Christ Lutheran Church and St. Paul’s United Church of Christ parking lots.

Tree limbs, sticks, shrub or hedge trimmings, grass, stones or any other foreign objects are not to be deposited in the leaves; otherwise the leaves will not be collected. ## SAFETY TIPS FOR DOWNED POWER LINES



Downed power lines can carry an electric current strong enough to cause serious injury or even death. Electricity wants to move from a high voltage zone to a low voltage zone – and it could go through your body.

- If you see a downed power line, move away from it and anything touching it. The ground around power lines – up to 35 feet away – may be energized.
- You cannot tell whether or not a power line is energized just by looking at it. You should assume that all downed power lines are live.
- The proper way to move away from the power line is to shuffle away with small steps, keeping your feet together and on the ground at all times. This will minimize the potential for a strong electric shock.
- If you see someone who is in direct or indirect contact with the downed line, do not touch the person. You could become the next victim. Call 911 for help.
- Do not attempt to move a downed power line or anything else in contact with it by using an object such as a broom or stick. Even non-conductive materials, like wood or cloth, can conduct electricity if even slightly wet.
- Be careful not to touch or step in water near where a downed power line is located.
- Do not drive over downed power lines.
- If your car comes in contact with a downed power line while you are inside, stay in the car. Honk your horn to summon help, but direct others to stay away from your car.
- If you must leave your car because it is on fire, jump out of the vehicle with both feet together and avoid contact with both the car and the ground at the same time. Shuffle away from the car.

Here's what you need to know first:**

Whether you are planning to do it yourself or hire a professional, smart digging means calling 811 before each job.

Homeowners often make risky assumptions about whether or not they should get their utility lines marked, but every digging job requires a call – even small projects like planting trees and shrubs. The depth of utility lines varies and there may be multiple utility lines in a common area. Digging without calling can disrupt service to an entire neighborhood, harm you and those around you and potentially result in fines and repair costs. Calling 811 before every digging job gets your underground utility lines marked for free and helps prevent undesired consequences.



## HOW TO PREPARE FOR A WINTER STORM

### Pick up basic survival items:

You should have enough supplies to survive without leaving your house for a few days, as well as tools to help you leave if necessary. Stock up!

- ☛ Shovel
- ☛ Flashlight & Batteries
- ☛ Candles
- ☛ Non-perishable Food
- ☛ Non-electric Can Opener
- ☛ Bottled Water
- ☛ Blankets & Warm Clothing
- ☛ Extra Hat, Gloves & Socks
- ☛ Camping Stove or Grill & Fuel
- ☛ Matches
- ☛ Battery Operated Radio
- ☛ Prescription Medications
- ☛ First-Aid Kit
- ☛ Cell phone w/Cord or Portable Charger
- ☛ Other: Diapers, Formula, Pet Supplies, etc.
- ☛ Non-electric Entertainment – Books, Cards, Board Games
- ☛ Portable Fire Extinguisher
- ☛ Full Tank of Gas in Car

### Keep yourself warm:

- ☛ Stop your pipes from freezing by turning on every faucet so that it's dripping just slightly. Keeping the water moving through the pipes should help prevent them from freezing.
- ☛ Seal up any drafts. Put towels at the bottom of any doors that have a gap, or around loose windows. If your windows are single-paned, close the curtains or pin a blanket up over them to keep the heat in.
- ☛ Dress in layers.
- ☛ Wear a hood.
- ☛ Stay in bed.
- ☛ Cuddle up.
- ☛ Conserve energy.

### Stay updated:

- ☛ Having current information is vital in an emergency, so make arrangements to stay informed.
- ☛ Keep tabs on your family members. Find out where everyone is prior to the storm & make a plan to stay in a safe location.

### Anticipate a long power outage:


- ☛ Keep the fridge closed. Only open when absolutely necessary, grab what you need, and close it up.
- ☛ Put frozen items outside. If temperatures are below freezing, you could also keep refrigerated items in an enclosed porch.
- ☛ Plan some entertainment.

### HERE'S SOME LONG TERM PREPARATION:

1. **Winterize your home** – Protecting your house & outbuildings from the cold can save you a lot of money & hassle down the road.
  - a. Insulate walls & attics, caulk & weather-strip doors & windows and install storm windows or cover windows with plastic.
  - b. Clear rain gutters & repair roof leaks to avoid clogging & flooding.
  - c. Cut away tree branches that could fall on the house or other structure during a storm.
  - d. Insulate pipes.
  - e. Check the structural strength of the roof to make sure it can sustain the weight of snow.
2. **Invest in a carbon monoxide detector** – If you ever need to run a gas stove inside your home for heat or cooking, you'll want a carbon monoxide detector on-hand. Carbon monoxide is odorless & colorless, but deadly.
3. **Keep your supplies current** – Check the batteries every so often & make sure you have potable water & non-perishable food to last your family at least 48 hours. Every year or two replace your canned good with a fresh batch.

# WATERSHED ALLIANCE OF YORK

The purpose of the WAY is to increase public awareness about the importance of local watersheds to community health, sustainable economies, and environmental quality of the Chesapeake Bay. Participants can get to know their watershed and the folks and organizations who are working hard to enhance, restore and protect them.



## **DID YOU KNOW?**

The Chesapeake Bay is the largest estuary in the United States. It is an incredible complex ecosystem that includes important habitats and food webs. The Chesapeake Bay watershed stretches across more than 64,000 square miles, encompassing parts of six states- Delaware, Maryland, New York, Pennsylvania, Virginia and West Virginia- as well as the entire District of Columbia.

Threading through the Chesapeake Bay watershed are more than 100,000 streams and rivers called tributaries. These tributaries eventually flow into the Bay. Everyone in the Bay watershed lives within a few minutes of one of those streams and rivers, which are like pipelines for our communities to the Bay.


## **WHEN IT RAINS IT DRAINS...**

Rain is an important part of the nature's water cycle, but there are times it can do more damage than good. Some of these problems related to storm runoff can include:

- Flooding caused by too much storm water flowing over hardened surfaces such as roads and parking lots instead of soaking into the ground
- Increased spending on maintaining storm drains and the sewer system because they become clogged with excessive amounts of dirt and debris
- Decreases in sport fish populations because storm water carries sediments and pollution that degrade fish habitats
- More expensive treatment to remove pollutants carried by storm water into our drinking water supplies

## **WHAT EVERYONE CAN DO TO HELP....**

- Properly dispose of hazardous substances such as oil, cleaning supplies and paint; never pour them down any part of the storm sewer system and report anyone that does
- Use pesticides, fertilizers, and herbicides properly and efficiently to prevent excess runoff
- Look for signs of soil and other pollutants, such as debris and chemicals, leaving construction sites in storm water runoff or tracked into roads by construction vehicles
- Install innovative storm water practices on residential property, such as rain barrels or rain gardens, that capture storm water and keep it on site instead of letting it drain away into the storm sewer system
- Pick up after pets and dispose of their waste properly. No matter where pets make a mess-in a backyard or at the park-storm water runoff can carry pet waste from the land to the storm water system or stream
- Store materials that could pollute storm water indoors and use containers for outdoor storage that do not rust or leak to eliminate exposure of materials to storm water



## **WE ALL LIVE IN A WATERSHED!!!**

Our community is preventing storm water pollution through a storm water management program. This program addresses storm water pollution from construction, new development, illegal dumping into the storm sewer system, pollution prevention, and good housekeeping practices in municipal operations. We also continue to educate the community and get everyone involved in making sure the only thing that storm water contributes to our water is...WATER! Contact you community's storm water management program coordinator or the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection for more information about storm water management.




Come see the annual



## IMPORTANT INFORMATION FROM DALLASTOWN EMA

This year EMA was able to partner with York Area Regional Police to help insure that there were continuous communications in the event of an incident. We are happy to report that the only thing needed was our staff's time. A special thank you to Sergeant Pete Montgomery for allowing us to partner with police at the command center during the carnival.

One of the ongoing projects that EMA has is ECRIN-Evacuating County Residents In Need. Just imagine, you or a loved one has a disability. There is a need to evacuate and maybe the primary care giver or support is unable to reach the family member, or it is too difficult to move the person away from his/her home. This is where ECRIN would come in. EMA maintains a confidential database of residents in Dallastown Borough that may need help to safely leave their residence in a time of emergency.

This is not just for bed bound individuals, but those who need assistance with mobility, including those who use assistive devices to move around such as canes, walkers, wheelchairs, or other such devices. Persons with service animals also have special needs, just having a lack of mobility, such as trouble walking, inability to maneuver around steps or other obstacles, those in our area who may not have family or friends that are close enough to help, persons with disabilities, mental and physical, and any other special needs. This program is completely voluntary and confidential, the records are maintained at York County 911 and ONLY used in an emergency to facilitate an evacuation in the case of an emergency.

## Insight from our District Justice

### Reminder For When Headlights Must Be Used When Driving

A change in the law occurring in 2007 regulating when head and other lights must be utilized by drivers seems to still be confusing to some or it may be that persons just have not been properly advised on the subject.

Section 4302 of Title 75 Pa. C.S.A (the PA Vehicle Code) establishes the Periods for requiring lighted lamps when a vehicle is being operated upon a highway.

Generally speaking, head lights and other lights are required to be displayed between sunset and sunrise or any time when the operator of the vehicle cannot discern a person or another vehicle upon the highway, from a distance of 1,000 feet due to insufficient light or when the atmospheric conditions are unfavorable due to rain, snow, sleet, hail, fog, smoke or smog.

The section was amended in 2007 to include the following time/s: ***any time when the vehicles windshield wipers are in continuous or intermittent use due to precipitation or atmospheric moisture, including rain, snow, sleet or mist.***

Many folks believe that if their vehicle is equipped with daytime running lights or some sort of auxiliary lights, such as fog lights or driving lights, that those are sufficient to meet the requirements of this section. That is **not** the case! The regulation is specific, indicating that it must be HEAD LAMPS and other lamps. The other lamps referred to are parking lamps and taillights. The difference between headlamps and daytime running lights is the amount of intensity being emitted from the light.

So please remember that any time you are driving in some sort of inclement weather, whether or not it is dark, wherein you must use your windshield wipers, that your must also have your headlights on and please drive carefully.



## WEATHER

The definition of weather is the state of the atmosphere at a specific time and with respect to its effect on life and human activities.

HERE ARE A FEW THINGS WE WILL BE EXPERIENCING IN THE NEXT FEW MONTHS:



### WIND

Wind is air in motion. It is produced by the uneven heating of the earth's surface by the sun. Since the earth's surface is made up of various land & water formations, it absorbs the sun's radiation unevenly. Two factors are necessary to specify wind: speed & direction.

As the sun warms the earth's surface, the atmosphere warms too. Some parts of the earth receive direct rays from the sun all year and are always warm. Other places receive indirect rays, so the climate is colder. Warm air, which weighs less than cold air, rises. Then cool air moves in & replaces the rising warm air. This movement of air is what makes the wind blow.

Wind is the fastest growing source of electricity in the world and one of the least expensive forms of renewable power available. Generating power from the wind leaves no dangerous waste products behind. Best of all, its supply is unlimited!

### TEMPERATURE



Temperature is a degree of hotness or coldness that can be measured using a thermometer. It's also a measure of how fast the atoms and molecules of a substance are moving. Temperature is measured in degrees on the Fahrenheit, Celsius & Kelvin scales.

The wind chill index is the temperature your body feels when the air temperature is combined with the wind speed. The higher the wind speed the faster exposed areas of your body lose heat & the cooler you feel.

Here's a wind chill index conversion chart for you to calculate the wind chill yourself!

### WINTER STORMS




Winter storms derive their energy from the clash of 2 air masses of different temperatures & moisture levels. Winter storms usually form when an air mass of cold, dry, Canadian air moves south and interacts with a warm, moist air mass moving north from the Gulf of Mexico. The point where these 2 air masses meet is called a front.



Snow is commonly formed when water vapor changes directly to ice without first becoming a liquid, high in the atmosphere at a temperature of less than 32° & then falls to the ground.

A blizzard is a long-lasting snowstorm with very strong winds and intense snowfall. Cold air at the surface, lots of moisture & warm air rising over the cold air are all needed to have a blizzard.



Ice storms form when a layer of warm air is between 2 layers of cold air. Frozen precipitation melts while falling into the warm air layer and then refreezes in the cold layer above the ground. This creates freezing rain or a glaze of ice.

## MAKE A CRYSTAL SNOWFLAKE

### YOU'LL NEED:

- String
- Wide Mouth Jar
- White Pipe Cleaners
- Blue Food Coloring (optional)
- Boiling Water (get an adult to help)
- Borax
- Small Wooden Rod or Pencil

### INSTRUCTIONS:

1. Grab a white pipe cleaner & cut into 3 equal pieces. Twist these sections together in the center so that you now have a shape that looks something like a six-sided star. Make sure the points of your shape are even by trimming them to the same length.
2. Take the top of one of the pipe cleaners & attach a piece of string to it then tie the string to the small wooden rod or pencil. You will use this to hang your completed snowflake.
3. Carefully fill the jar with boiling water (get an adult to help).
4. For each cup of water add 3 tablespoons of borax, adding 1 tablespoon at a time. Stir until the mixture is dissolved. (Don't worry if some of the borax settles at the base of the jar.)
5. Add some of the blue food coloring if you'd like to give your snowflake a nice bluish tinge.
6. Put the pipe cleaner snowflake into the jar so that the small wooden rod or pencil is resting on the edge of the jar and the snowflake is sitting freely in the borax solution.
7. Leave the snowflake overnight and when you return in the morning you will find the snowflake covered in crystals! It makes a great decoration!
