# BOROUGH NEWS.....



The Dallastown-Yoe Water Authority will be flushing hydrants beginning April 21<sup>st</sup>. Please be aware that some discoloration of the water may occur, and you could be without water or have very low pressure for short periods of time during the flushing process. **Make sure your water is not discolored before doing laundry.** Flushing should be completed by May 23<sup>rd</sup>.



## STREET SWEEPING.....

Borough Maintenance should be starting the street sweeping approximately the third week in April. The process should take about 4 weeks.

## FIRE SIREN.....

Rescue Fire Company is in the process of repairing the fire alert siren on top of the Historical Society building on E. Main Street. The siren will be sounding for approximately 15 to 20 seconds to alert the volunteers of a fire call. The siren will only sound between the hours of 6:00 am and 9:00 pm beginning sometime in April.

## POOLS.....

**All Pools (temporary or permanent) capable of holding 24 inches of water or more,** must meet the building code regulations of Dallastown Borough. Please fill out the building permit application prior to setting up your pool.




## TREES & SHRUBS OVERHANGING THE STREETS & SIDEWALKS.....

Trees that are overhanging streets & sidewalks should be trimmed up about 15 feet. Bushes & shrubs growing out into the streets & sidewalks should be trimmed away from the right-of-way.



## GRASS GROWING IN THE CURBS & SIDEWALKS.....

The sidewalks adjacent to your property are yours to maintain. Grass & weeds are to be removed from curbing & sidewalks, including where the curb joins the street, and around utility poles & traffic signs. Help Dallastown Borough keep its small-town charm by



removing the weeds from your sidewalks. Kindly refrain from discharging grass clippings into the streets or on the sidewalks.

## GRASS GROWING IN EXCESS OF 8 INCHES ON YOUR PROPERTY.....

Grass & other vegetation shall be maintained to a height of no more than 8 inches on your property. Poison ivy and other nuisance "weeds" shall be removed as well.

## VEHICLES.....

All vehicles parked outside of an enclosed structure (garage) shall be current with both inspection & registration, shall not have flat tires or be dismantled and must be operable.

Some of you might have met him already.....his name is David Garabedian. He is a graduate of Red Lion Area Senior High and Clarion University where he received his BS in Business Administration with a minor in Industrial Relations.

## CITIZEN OF THE YEAR 2013




Dallastown Borough was proud to present Richard K. Bogart with the 2013 Outstanding Citizen Award. He was presented the award at a banquet in



## A WORD FROM EMA.....

Hopefully winter is finally behind us. The Boro was spared for the most part with only one opening of a shelter for a brief period. Kudos to everyone for taking care of each other. With warmer weather comes more time outside and longer days. We in Emergency Management look to the different season and what it can bring. Rest assured we will be ready. Have a great spring everyone.

A special thank you to the teamwork of Rescue Fire Company #1 Dallastown for their assistance with the safe evacuation of any residents in need. You're dedication to the community and willingness to work with Dallastown EMA is greatly appreciated.

One of the ongoing projects that EMA has is York County Special Needs Registry. This was formerly known as ERCIN. Just imagine, you or a loved one has a disability. There is a need to evacuate and maybe the primary care giver or support is unable to reach the family member, or it is too difficult to move the person away from his/her home. This is where the registry would come in. EMA maintains a confidential database of residents in Dallastown Borough that may need help to safely leave their residence in a time of emergency. This program is completely voluntary and confidential, the records are maintained at York County Human Services and ONLY used in an emergency to facilitate an evacuation if needed.


- Every Tuesday, at both 10:15 am & 11:15 am, we offer story time for those ages 3 to 5.



So what's the latest scoop on the Dallas Theater, is it going to reopen? The short answer is yes...but perhaps not exactly what you might have had in mind. ## Magisterial District Court

What exactly does the Magisterial District Court handle? The Court has

jurisdiction in the following matters: summary offenses arising as a result of violations of PA law; matters arising under the Landlord and Tenant Act within its jurisdictional boundaries; and civil claims involving contracts and/or damages wherein the dollar amount involved is \$12,000.00 or less.

In addition, the court presides over arraignments in which persons are charged with misdemeanor and/or felony violations of law wherein bail is set and accepted. In these cases, the court also presides over preliminary hearings for the purpose of determining the existence, or not, of sufficient evidence to warrant that it be sent to the York County Court of Common Pleas for trial.

The judge and employees of the District Court are **NOT** permitted to provide legal advice to persons regarding any legal action/s. Sometimes this is misunderstood as not being helpful. Please keep this in mind and respect that court employees must maintain a high level of impartiality to ensure fairness.

Persons who wish to file civil suits can obtain and complete a complaint at the District Court. However, for your convenience, you may also log onto [www.ujportal.pacourts.us](http://www.ujportal.pacourts.us) and download, complete and subsequently drop off the complaint and filing fees at the appropriate District Court to initiate your claim.

This website is also available for paying outstanding fines, as well as, viewing the public docket sheet. The public docket sheet consists of statewide court records that are available for public viewing.

York County now has a "Self Help Center" to help litigants who may need or want assistance in filing, pursuing and/or litigating a case at the District Court. The center is open during normal business hours and is located on the first floor of the York County Judicial Center located at 45 North George Street York, PA.

**Meet Penny!** Penny is Penn Waste's official mascot. Read her story below and learn how you can help Penny in her mission to save the planet.



## THE RECIPE BOX

### Springtime Pasta Salad



#### Ingredients:

- 2 cups spiral veggie pasta
- 1 cucumber – peeled, seeded & chopped
- ½ cup sliced black olives
- ¼ cup chopped red onion
- ½ cup mayonnaise
- ¼ cup sour cream
- 1 ¼ teaspoons dill weed
- ½ teaspoon salt
- ½ teaspoon dry mustard
- ¼ teaspoon garlic salt

#### Directions:

1. Bring a large pot of lightly salted water to a boil; cook pasta at a boil until tender yet firm to the bite, about 8 minutes; drain. Rinse pasta with cold water until cool; drain. Transfer pasta to a large bowl.
2. Stir cucumber, black olives, red onion, mayonnaise, sour cream, dill, salt, dry mustard and garlic salt together in a bowl; pour over the pasta and gently mix to coat evenly.
3. Cover bowl with plastic wrap; refrigerate for 2 hours before serving.



## 10 REASONS TO RECYCLE

1. **Recycling is good for our economy** – American companies rely on recycling programs to provide the raw materials they need to make new products.
2. **Recycling creates jobs** – Recycling in the US is a \$236 billion a year industry. More than 56,000 recycling and reuse enterprises employ 1.1 million workers nationwide.
3. **Recycling reduces waste in landfills** – the average American discards 7.5 pounds of garbage every day. Most of this garbage goes into landfills, where it is compacted and buried.
4. **Recycling is good for the environment** – Recycling requires far less energy, uses fewer national resources and keeps waste from piling up in landfills.
5. **Recycling saves energy** – Recycling saves energy compared manufacturing with virgin materials. Manufacturing using recycled aluminum cans uses 95% less energy.
6. **Recycling reduces our dependence on oil** – Four percent of America’s annual oil consumption goes into the production of plastic and this amounts to about 219 barrels of oil each year. The more plastic that is recycled, the less dependence on oil there will be.
7. **Recycling prevents global warming** – In 2000, recycling of solid waste prevented the release of 32.9 million metric tons of carbon equivalent (the unit of measure for greenhouse gases) into the air.
8. **Recycling reduces water pollution** – Making goods from recycled materials generates far less water pollution than manufacturing from virgin materials.
9. **Recycling protects wildlife** – Using recycled materials reduces the need to damage forests, wetlands, rivers and other places essential to wildlife.

**Recycling creates new demand** – Recycling and buying recycled products creates demand for more recycled products, decreasing waste and helping our environment.

## SAFETY TIPS FOR YOUR 4<sup>TH</sup> OF JULY CELEBRATION

With warm weather and family events, the Fourth of July can be a fun time with great memories. But before your family celebrates, make sure everyone knows about fireworks safety.

1. Kids should never play with fireworks. If you give kids sparklers, make sure they keep them outside and away from the face, clothing, and hair.
2. Buy only legal fireworks (legal fireworks have a label with the manufacturer's name and directions; illegal ones are unlabeled), and store them in a cool, dry place.
3. Never try to make your own fireworks.
4. Always use fireworks outside and have a bucket of water and a hose nearby in case of accidents.
5. Don't hold fireworks in your hand or have any part of your body over them while lighting.
6. Point fireworks away from homes, and keep away from brush and leaves and flammable substances.
7. Light one firework at a time (not in glass or metal containers), and **never** relight a dud.
8. Soak all fireworks in a bucket of water before throwing them in the trash can.
