

Also, remember the only person who can keep our town safe and free of crime is you. If you see something or someone that does not look right, **please call 911.**



# BOROUGH NEWS.....



The Dallastown-Yoe Water Authority will be flushing hydrants beginning

approximately the last week of April thru the end of May. Please be aware that some discoloration of the water may occur, and you could be without water or have very low pressure for short periods of time during the flushing process. **Make sure your water is not discolored before doing laundry.**



## STREET SWEEPING.....

Borough Maintenance should be starting the street sweeping approximately the third week in April. The process should take about 4 weeks. Please have your sidewalks cleaned before street sweeping begins. Thank you!

## POTHOLES.....

With the harsh winter that we've had, it's almost a guarantee that there will be potholes throughout the Borough. If you happen to discover any that Borough Maintenance has not, please contact the Borough Office at 244-6626. Thanks so much for your help!



## STREET LIGHTS.....

If you happen to see a street light that is out or not functioning properly, please contact the Borough Office. We are not always around at night to see the problems first-hand, so any help would be greatly appreciated.

## TAX COLLECTOR.....

Linda Shaub, the Dallastown Borough Tax Collector will be at the Borough Office on Thursday, April 14<sup>th</sup> from 10:00 am to 2:00 pm and Friday, April 15<sup>th</sup> from noon to 4:00 pm. She will be located in the Council Room to the rear of the building. Please enter thru the double glass doors on the side of the building.



## VEHICLES.....

All vehicles parked outside of an enclosed structure (garage) shall be current with both inspection & registration, shall not have flat tires or be dismantled and must be operable.



## POOLS.....

All Pools (temporary or permanent) capable of holding 24 inches of water or more, must meet the building code regulations of Dallastown Borough. Please fill out the building permit application prior to setting up your pool.

## TREES & SHRUBS OVERHANGING THE STREETS & SIDEWALKS.....

Trees that are overhanging streets & sidewalks should be trimmed up about 15 feet. Bushes & shrubs growing out into the streets & sidewalks should be trimmed away from the right-of-way.



## GRASS GROWING IN THE CURBS & SIDEWALKS.....

The sidewalks adjacent to your property are yours to maintain. Grass & weeds are to be removed from curbing & sidewalks, including where the curb joins the street, and around utility poles & traffic signs. Help Dallastown Borough keep its small-town charm by removing the weeds from your sidewalks. Kindly refrain from discharging grass clippings into the streets or on the sidewalks.



## GRASS GROWING IN EXCESS OF 8 INCHES ON YOUR PROPERTY.....

Grass & other vegetation shall be maintained to a height of no more than 8 inches on your property. Poison ivy and other nuisance "weeds" shall be removed as well.


## WILDLIFE CONTROL.....





The EMA Office is located in the Borough Office Building on Broad Street. A message can be left at 244-6626 if you are in need of materials or would like to schedule an educational training.



## **Where Does the Money Go?**

Have you ever received a fine for a minor violation of the law and wondered what happens to the monies that the District Court office collects in the form of fines and costs? The District Court is tasked with the collection of fines and costs for all summary violations committed within its jurisdiction. These types of violations include things such as traffic violations; minor criminal violations such as disorderly conduct, criminal mischief; truancy (unlawful absences from school); and violations of the Fish and Game Code.

Once collected, all monies must then be disbursed to different entities depending on the type/s of violations. The District Court ensures that victims of minor crimes are reimbursed for any damages that they have suffered. In addition, The Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, the County of York and the local municipalities all receive monies from the imposition of fines and court costs collected, as well as, the school districts who receive monies as a result of the imposition of fines for truancy.

Over the past four years, the District Court collected monies in the amounts listed.

KBL provides free Education to all. We offer children the following regularly scheduled Classes, where literature is used to teach the foundations of reading & learning.


- Every Tuesday, at both 10:15 & 11:15, we offer Preschool Literacy Class for those ages 3 to 5.

- Mystery Readers meet the fourth Tuesday of the month at noon. Please check the monthly calendar of events for the selected mystery.






Children (ages 2-12) will be divided into age groups and there will be prize eggs & special treats. The Easter Bunny should be there also to join in the fun!




This year's **National Day of Prayer** will take place on Thursday, May 5<sup>th</sup> at 7:00 pm. The location will be the same as last year at St.

- ☺ S. Pleasant Avenue was paved for the first time in 1924. Union State Bank, which was beside the Dallas Theatre, held the note.
- ☺ Sechrist Bros. Butcher Shop at 32 E. Main Street was founded by Jacob Sechrist in 1877.
- ☺ The Dallas Theatre, located at 16 E. Main Street, was built in 1927 by Augustus Wagman. Silent movies were originally shown there, accompanied by a pianist positioned in the orchestra pit.
- ☺ From 1880 to 1940 the Dallastown Cigar Industry was at its height.







5. Dispose of hazardous home chemicals, unused medications and oil based paint products at your local hazardous waste site.
6. Use pesticides and other lawn chemicals sparingly.
7. Pick up and properly dispose of leaves and grass clippings.
8. Install a rain garden, use a rain barrel and reduce impervious surfaces around your home.
9. Plant trees and plants that serve as natural filters.
10. Always use a trash can to dispose of waste and recycle reusable materials.





# THE BALD EAGLE.....some fun facts

1. Bald Eagles live in North American and are birds of prey, meaning they hunt for their food.
2. They are carnivores meaning they eat meat. Their main source of food is fish, however they also eat smaller birds, rodents, squirrels & rodents.
3. Females can be up to 3 feet and are slightly bigger than males that can be up to 2.8 feet. Their wingspan can be 7 feet wide.
4. Bald Eagles can fly up to 10,000 feet above the ground and up to 40 miles per hour.
5. Bald Eagles aren't bald at all, but are called bald because of their white heads.
6. They are dark brown with yellow beaks, large hooked claws called talons and white heads & tails.
7. They have 7,000 feathers and when they lose one feather from one wing they will lose one from the other wing too.
8. During mating season (September - April), males & females will work together to build large nests with sticks. The average nest is 4 to 5 feet wide, but can be up to 8 feet wide.
9. During courtship, bald eagles perform cartwheels in the sky. They hook their talons & spin down from the sky towards the ground. They let go of each other before hitting the ground, then soar back up into the sky.
10. A baby eagle is called an eaglet.
11. Eaglets are light brown & fluffy when they are born and don't get their white heads until they are 4 to 5 years old.
12. A Bald Eagle can live 20 to 30 years in the wild and over 30 years in captivity.
