## **Penn Waste Holiday Collection Schedule...**

Holidays observed by Penn Waste, trash collection (trash, recycle and bulk pick up) will be shifted a day. Any questions, please call Penn Waste 767-4456.

**SIDEWALKS** – Snow/ice is to be removed from the sidewalks within 24 hours after a winter storm ceases. Properties at street intersections: **please** clear the snow that piles up at the sidewalk corners. This will help school children, the postal service and other pedestrians safely cross the street. We ask those who do not have sidewalks to follow this as well.

**PLOWING STREETS** – The snow plows will be plowing snow from “curb to curb” to remove as much snow from the streets as possible. This process takes time so please have patience and bear with us as we work to clear the streets as quickly as we can. When removing snow from your sidewalks, do not shovel the snow into the streets.

**\*\*In heavy snow storms, plows will be clearing driving lanes as quickly as possible and then will go back to work on clearing the sides/shoulders of the roads from curb to curb. Unfortunately, this sometimes pushes snow back on to your sidewalks which you may already have shoveled. If this occurs, we apologize for the inconvenience and added work that it may cause you, but it is essential to make our streets safe.**

In the event of a **Snow Emergency**, announcements will be made on **WGAL-TV 8, FOX 43, ABC 27 WHTM, WARM 103.3, 96.1 WSOX, WGTY GREAT COUNTRY 107.7, WYCR 98.5 THE PEAK**, and the local newspapers.

**NO PARKING** will be allowed on the “snow emergency routes” when an emergency is declared. Vehicles that are not moved will be towed at the vehicle owner’s expense.

***Snow Emergency Routes:***

The following streets shall be declared snow emergency routes: (they are marked)

- Main St.
- South side of W. Maple St. from Borough Line to N. Walnut St.
- South side of E. Maple St. from N. Walnut St. to N. Park St.
- N. Walnut St. from Main St. to Maple St.
- S. Walnut from Main St. to E. Gay St.
- E. Gay St. from S. Walnut St. to S. Pleasant Ave.
- N. Pleasant Ave. from Main St. to E. Broad St.
- E. Broad St. from N. Pleasant Ave. to N. Lombard St.
- N. Lombard St. from E. Broad St. to Borough Line
- S. Pleasant Ave. from Main St. to Borough Line
- N. Park St. from Main St. to E. Maple St.



Temporary parking is available at the following locations when a snow emergency is in effect: Fire Company parking lot, High School and Elementary School parking lots and Bethlehem United Methodist Church, Christ Lutheran Church and St. Paul’s United Church of Christ parking lots.

Please know that anytime you have a concern or a question, you may call the Borough Office at 244-6626.

## LEAF COLLECTION IN THE BOROUGH

Leaf collection will run from the first week of October through mid-December, weather permitting.



Tuesdays will be designated to the east side of the borough and Wednesdays will be designated to the west side. Please remember to rake them as close to the edge of the curb as possible away from cars, fences, posts or poles. Tree limbs, sticks, shrub or hedge trimmings, grass, stones or any other foreign objects are not to be deposited in the leaves; otherwise the leaves will not be collected. Thank you for your cooperation.

## WHY RECYCLE?

According to the Department of Environmental Protection (DEP), recycling in Pennsylvania in 2005 saved over 98 trillion BTUs of energy, enough to power 941,000 houses.

-  For each ton of plastic recycled we save the equivalent of the energy used by 2 people in 1 year.
-  Every pound of steel recycled saves 5,450 BTU's of energy, enough to light a 60-watt bulb for over 26 hours.
-  Recycling one ton of paper would save enough energy to power the average American home for 6 months.
-  The process of recycling paper instead of making it from new materials generates 74% less air pollution and uses 50% less water.
-  Recycling creates jobs. The recycling business employs collectors, sorters, processors, manufacturers, designers, scientists, administrators and researchers.

## ELECTRONICS RECYCLING

The York County Solid Waste Authority has an Electronics Recycling Program which is held the third Saturday of every month. Residents, businesses, non-profits and institutions can participate from 9:00 am to 1:00 pm by bring unlimited amounts of electronic devices to the Authority's Yard Waste Transfer Facility on Flour Mill Road in York.

**Directions from I-83:** Proceed on I-83 to Exit 21 (Arsenal Rd/Rt 30 East). As you come off the exit ramp, get immediately into the far left turning lane and proceed to stoplight at the intersection of Toronita St and Rt 30 (you will see Round The Clock Dinner on your left). Turn left at the stoplight onto Toronita St which turns into Blackbridge Rd. Proceed approximately 2 miles to Flour Mill Rd. Turn right onto Flour Mill Rd, the Yard Waste Transfer Facility will be on your right.



## DALLASTOWN-YOE WATER AUTHORITY ANNOUNCES NEW WATER SHUT OFF PROCEDURES FOR 2015

**Dallastown-Yoe Water shut offs will be handled differently beginning in 2015. A letter will be going out to all customers in November explaining the new procedures and fees.**

Homeowners often make risky assumptions about whether or not they should get their utility lines marked, but every digging job requires a call – even small projects like planting trees and shrubs. The depth of utility lines varies and there may be multiple utility lines in a common area. Digging without calling can disrupt service to an entire neighborhood, harm you and those around you and potentially result in fines and repair costs. Calling 811 before every digging job gets your underground utility lines marked for free and helps prevent undesired consequences.

## UPDATE ON PROGRESS AT THE DALLAS THEATER GRAPHIX LOFT



So the expectation of the Dallas Theater reopening this fall under the new moniker, "The Graphix Loft" doesn't look as promising as it did this past spring. No one is disappointed more than Doug Miller, the current owner of the property. "I've spent considerable time on the planning stages over the summer but didn't estimate how challenging the existing sloped floor would play into the renovations. I have been meeting with engineers, draftsmen and contractors to come to a feasible solution for the renovation of the property. We have come up with a few floor plan options to date and factored in some cost options, but all the details still have to be worked out to determine which direction is the most viable within my budget."

He also added, "The other challenge is the amount of regulations that are in place with a renovation of this scale...even though I worked in the home construction business I didn't anticipate all the Building Codes, ADA and safety requirements that are in place, even for a non-conforming property such as this."

Even with all these challenges he said that he is still determined to see the project through to completion and try to maintain the integrity of the space as much as the law will allow. "I know this property holds a lot of nostalgia for residents of Dallastown, so I consider it my responsibility to show good stewardship of this property." If all goes according to plan he is looking for a grand opening in the spring of 2015, we wish him well!

## SOME THINGS YOU CAN DO TO HELP THE FIREFIGHTERS:

- ☞ **Make sure chimneys are clean.** A wood-burning fireplace can give you many hours of enjoyment, but your chimney requires some routine maintenance and attention. There is no firm rule on how often you should clean a chimney. Use your fireplace poker or other metal device to scrape away some of the black substance (creosote) from the fireplace lining. If the creosote buildup is paper-thin, no cleaning is required. If the buildup is 1/8 of an inch, you should schedule a cleaning. A buildup of 1/8 to 1/4 inch requires an immediate cleaning. If there is a buildup of more than 1/4 of an inch, you should not use the fireplace until it has been properly cleaned. (Make certain to wear eye protection and a dust mask when making your inspection.)
- ☞ **Clear fire hydrants.** If there is a fire hydrant near your home, please make sure that it is clear of snow this winter. If, by chance, there was a fire in the area and the firefighters needed to use the hydrant, locating it and cleaning snow away from it could waste valuable time needed to fight the fire.



## SMOKE DETECTORS

The Rescue Fire Company at 50 S. School Place has smoke detectors for Borough residents only, free of charge. The limit is one per household while the supply lasts.



A properly installed and maintained smoke alarm is the first thing in your home that can alert you and your family to a fire 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Whether you're awake or asleep, a working smoke alarm is constantly on alert, scanning the air for fire and smoke.



Corporal Georgiou's "larger than life" personality and presence will be greatly missed at the department and in the law enforcement community of York County.

Corporal Dyke has been married for 19 years and is the father of three.

## OFFICER JEFFREY S. KERN –


Officer Kern retired from the department in July after 26 years of service. Officer Kern was hired in 1988 by the former York Township Police Department and continued in 2000 with the merger into the York Area Regional Police Department. Officer Kern also served with the former Red Lion Borough Police Department and he was honorably discharged after four years in the United States Navy. Officer Kern was the recipient of several department awards including three Chief's Commendations and was known as a dependable and experience member of his squad.



**RE-ACCREDITATION** – In June of this year, the department conducted the second Re-Assessment with the Pennsylvania Law Enforcement Accreditation Commission. The department was first accredited in 2008 and must undergo a re-assessment every three years. The assessment included a two day review of files, facilities, personnel interviews, and inspections in order to determine that the department was in compliance with the Commission standards. The assessors included the Chief of Police in Upper Moreland Township, a sergeant from the Allentown Police Department and the Accreditation Manager from the Derry Township Police Department. Fewer than 100 police departments in Pennsylvania, or less than 10% have been able to complete the rigorous requirements for accreditation and the personnel of the department have this seal of professionalism and best practices that cannot be claimed for most police agencies. Sergeant Jeffrey Dunbar was the manager of this process and completing the many preparations required for accreditation. As seen below, we proudly include the law enforcement accreditation seal.


## Rite Aid Gives Back to Local Senior Center







## What is a Rain Barrel?

A rain barrel collects and stores rainwater from your rooftop for use in your yard and garden. Water collected in a rain barrel would normally flow through your downspout, onto a paved surface and eventually into a storm drain.



### Benefits and Uses

You can use water from your rain barrel to:

- ☉ Fill Birdbaths
- ☉ Water Garden and Container Plants
- ☉ Water Indoor Plants
- ☉ Clean Garden Tools

Rainwater is naturally soft and contains no minerals and chemicals. When used for watering plants, rainwater will leave no calcium carbonate residue.

Rain barrels help lower water costs. It is estimated that 40% of water used during summer is for lawn and garden maintenance.


Rain barrels reduce stormwater runoff resulting in:

- ☉ Fewer pollutants in our stormwater.
- ☉ Less potential for localized flooding.

One inch of rainfall produces .6 gallon of water per square foot. This results in 600-700 gallons of water flowing from the average house during a one inch rain storm.

### Warning!

Though excellent for watering plants, rain barrel water should not be used as a potable water source. Do not use for drinking, washing or cooking.



To prevent mosquitoes from breeding in your rain barrel, keep connections tight and screens or other covers in place. Mosquito dunks can be used or 1 tablespoon of vegetable oil can be placed in the rain barrel to form a film on the top of the water.

### How can I increase the water pressure?

Water pressure is directly related to the level of water in the barrel. The higher the water level, the greater the pressure. Elevating the barrel can also increase the pressure. Just be sure the barrel is placed on a stable, level surface.

### Will my rain barrel tip over?

Water weighs a little over 8 lbs. per gallon, so a 50-gallon rain barrel will weigh over 400 pounds when full. If you have small children or pets, and are concerned that the barrel might tip over, you may want to strap or attach the barrel to a nearby wall or other stable structure (fence, tree, etc.). A frame can also be built around the barrel.

### More Storage


Multiple barrels can be linked to provide more storage. Connect the overflow from the first barrel to subsequent barrels. Connecting multiple barrels using 2" PVC pipe will handle even large storms. Each barrel will need a hose bibb near the bottom to allow each barrel to be completely emptied.



### Painting Your Barrel

Krylon Fusion is recommended for painting plastic, including rain barrels.

1 can will cover a barrel, but 2 cans will ensure good coverage and allow left over for touch-ups.




Before painting, sand the barrel with fine grit (220 or higher) sandpaper. Then clean the surface with an ammonia base cleaner.


### Step 1:

Using a jigsaw or 4 1/2" hole saw, cut hole in top of barrel to fit downspout adapter. An alternative method is to remove the entire top of barrel and place screen over the top secured with a bungee cord.



### Step 2 - Hose Bibb:

With a jigsaw or 1 3/4" hole saw, cut a hole centered 2 1/2" off bottom of barrel. Using a piece of hose or string, guide 3/4" tank fitting through top hole and out bottom hole. Secure with nut (left handed thread). Wrap threads of brass hose bibb with Teflon tape and screw into tank fitting. Garden hose can now be attached to hose bibb.



### Supplies:

- ♦ Large (55 gal) Barrel
- ♦ 3/4" Brass Hose Bibb
- ♦ 3/4" Tank Fitting (for hose bibb)
- ♦ 1 1/4" Tank Fitting (for overflow)
- ♦ Reducer (to fit overflow hose)
- ♦ Overflow Hose
- ♦ Downspout Adapter (2"X3" or 3"X4")
- ♦ Filter Basket
- ♦ Teflon Tape
- ♦ Drill
- ♦ Jigsaw or Hole Saw
- ♦ Piece of Hose or String at least 4' long
- ♦ Channel Lock Pliers
- ♦ Tape Measure
- ♦ Marker


### Step 3 - Overflow:

Using a jigsaw or 2 1/2" hole saw, cut center of hole 4" from top of barrel. Place 1 3/4" tank fitting in hole and secure. Screw reducer into fitting. Attach overflow hose.




### Step 4 - Downspout Connection:

Place strainer basket and downspout adapter in hole. Downspout can be cut to exact height to fit in adapter or a flexible downspout section can be used to make the connection.

# MAKE YOUR VERY OWN TURKEY!!




## What you'll need

- Medium sized brown paper bag (not lunch size)
- Acrylic paint or crayons in brown, orange, red, green, and yellow
- Rubber band
- Newspaper
- Plastic spoon
- Felt scraps in brown, orange, green, and red
- 2 Medium googly eyes
- Scissors
- Glue

## How to make it

1. Lay paper bag flat on the work surface. Use crayons or paint (crayons are less messy and will be much easier for younger children) to add stripes of colors to the opening of the bag, about 5-6" long. Be sure to add stripes to the sides as well.
2. Cut the strips with scissors. Paint or color the other side of the strips. This is a little messier, so be sure kid are wearing smocks and your work surface is protected. When painting the other side of a strip, the paper may curl up on you. Just hold it flat for a few seconds and this will correct it (see image). Allow the strips to dry completely.
3. Fill the bag halfway with crumpled newspaper. Gather the bag together with your hands, just under the strips, and secure with a rubber band.
4. Pinch the bag, just under the rubber band, to bend the strips upward so that when the bag lies on its side, the strips will be pointing upward. Use your hands to manipulate the strips to point up; these are your turkey's feathers.
5. Cut a triangle out of orange felt for the beak. Cut a heart shape out of red or maroon felt for the wattle. Cut two triangles out of brown felt for the feet, and the cut two triangles out of each foot for the toes. Cut a bowtie out of green felt (or whatever color your little turkey maker wants). The bowtie can be a little fiddly to cut. Make it easier by cutting two triangles and a circle and glue them together. Glue the bow-tie where the spoon meets the bag.
